

From Our Dean: Kevin Rose —

As a young organist, I was introduced to the chorale preludes of Paul

Manz. Some of his works are more difficult, but others were immediately accessible to me as a young organist. I even had some recordings of Manz playing the organ at Mt. Olive Lutheran Church in Minneapolis. Later, I would learn the beautiful "E'en So, Lord Jesus, Quickly Come" in a church choir one Advent, and teach it to choirs I directed later on in my career. I even saw Paul Manz in person once for a hymn festival in the 1980's at First Lutheran Church in Dayton on a Wednesday

evening – we even invited a couple friends to come with us. Upon the news of Manz' recent death, I now regret that I didn't go up to him and introduce myself. I never did get to meet the man.

You would think, then, that the death of Paul Manz at the age of 90 would become just another piece of trivia in my mind. He lived a long life after all, and his wife had died over a year ago, and his health was failing. His time had come. I love the story of how people around him sang "E'en So, Lord Jesus, Quickly Come" as the end was nearing. Given these facts, I was not prepared for how I was to react to this news.

It was Thursday Night, and I was rehearsing my choir at Immaculate Conception, and we were singing "E'en So, Lord Jesus, Quickly Come." I told them the news. My choir was singing a capella, so I was able to conduct with much expression. It was in the middle section where the tempo speeds up and the choir reaches a crescendo (and the sopranos reach the highest notes of the piece) that I found myself nearly reduced to tears. In my conducting, I subconsciously ended up jumping a couple of times to drive home the intensity I wanted to hear (...hardly a conducting technique I was taught in school). I was at that moment both very thankful that such a beautiful piece of music had been written, and I was grieving the loss of a friend. My dear friend is someone I never met in person. That night, in the choir room at Immaculate Conception, all I can say is that Paul Manz was there among us, if only in spirit and song.

My choir will sing "E'en So, Lord Jesus, Quickly Come" on the second Sunday of Advent at the 11:00 mass just after communion. In closing, I wish all of you a blessed Advent, a Merry Christmas, and a Happy New Year. Even so, Lord Jesus, Quickly Come!

GUEST MUSICIANS -- Enhancing Sunday Worship by Tom Pulsifer, Sub Dean and Placement Coordinator

Once upon a time... my church, Faith Lutheran / Dayton, was bursting at the seams with people. The sanctuary was full every Sunday. Two identical services. Sunday School classes occupied every available nook and cranny. Twenty-eight in the Chancel Choir. Same number in Choristers (junior choir). A faithful group of handbell ringers. A busy congregation indeed.

But no more. Dayton's suburbs spread east and south. Other Lutheran congregations sprang up close to where the new homes were springing up. The children who once crowded into Faith's Sunday School grew up and moved away, leaving the parents to welcome them back to church only at Easter and Christmas. Faith Lutheran, like many other "older" congregations, and situated in "older" neighborhoods, faced a changing ministry. It still faces changes today. My congregation is now linked with two other nearby Lutheran congregations studying a possible three-way merger.

Anyway... No longer do twenty-eight choir members sing forth from our choir loft. There is no vocal choir. Not enough willing voices to sustain it. No longer do our handbells ring forth. Not enough ringers to depend upon, or even show up for rehearsal. No extensive musical talent remains within the congregation. Handbell cases collect dust and shelf-files of yellowing octavos sit idle.

But... we found a way to enhance our Sunday worship, by reaching out to available guest musicians who, in addition to the musical talent still available within our congregation, provide a wide variety of music for worship on many Sundays throughout the year. Not every Sunday, but many Sundays. Our guest musician program has been going on for quite a few years. The congregation even looks forward to many of our guests, asking "when is so-and-so

going to be with us again?" The line item in our budget, despite tough economic times, continues to be funded adequately with little complaint. We are able to pay the musicians who are not members of Faith Lutheran. Some of our guests have even refused their checks – just willing to share their God-given talents with folks who clearly welcome and appreciate them.

Perhaps I have some advantage here in locating guest musicians as I ran the talent division of Advertising & Talent Associates in Kettering for several years and then ran my own Arts Approach, LLC music and entertainment agency when ATA closed in 2003. Many of our guest musicians are musically active in their own churches, but are able to work in a visit to Faith here and there!

By the way, some Sundays I also plan and provide the "special music for worship". Example: On November 15th I played five varied Paul Manz organ works to honor the noted Lutheran organist, composer and teacher who passed away on October 28th.

We regularly have vocalists (from classic-trained to soul-ballad to contemporary Christian), an a capella vocal quartet, guitarists, flautists, a flute trio, violinist, 'cellists, harpists, trumpeters, a horn duo, a keyboard and violin duo, a keyboard and organ duo, and even a sacred harmonica (!) to call upon.

Yes, as organist and "music director" working with guest musicians to the extent we do takes a great deal of advance planning and organizing. But the result for Faith Lutheran has been clearly worth the effort, as we can now reach out beyond our immediate resources to help praise God through a variety of fine area musical talent – enhancing our total Sunday morning worship experience!

Janet Linker's Suggestions for Free Hymn Accompaniments

(given as a handout at the Piqua AGO Meeting/Workshop Nov. 2009)

- 1. Play in unison manuals only, or manuals and pedals (at some logical point go into harmony)
- 2. Three voices on manuals no pedal.
- 3. Four voices on manuals no pedal.
- 4. Solo out soprano on separate manual.
- 5. Pedal point, usually tonic or dominant. (E.g. if in key of C; 1 is C, 5 is G; hold it out)
- 6. Passing tones between thirds in alto, tenor or bass.
- 7. Upper and lower auxiliaries and suspension in alto, tenor or bass.
- 8. Rhythmic alteration-use sparingly (late or syncopated).
- 9. Stimtausch (voice exchange)
- 10. Descants alto or tenor on top, or create original descant.
- 11. Imitative material (canonic)
- 12. Free harmony. Forget rules (at first). Hear it before you play it. Try descending or ascending bass, diminished chords, false cadences.
- 13. Improvise introduction-use motivic material from hymn.
- 14. Improvise between stanzas-usually before final stanza.
- 15. Modulate to key $\frac{1}{2}$ or 1 step above-usually before final stanza.
- 16. Modulate to Doxology or other response from offertory.
- 17. Register according to text.
- 18. Buy published hymn accompaniments and copy ideas.
