## Don't You Just Love It When it All Comes Together?

Last Sunday, as I was moving through the outer narthex following morning worship, past the plates of frosted cookies, banana bread and doughnut holes (keep moving, Tom), someone came up to me and exclaimed happily how everything that morning came together so well.

Well. Yes. For once — it did! Yea for us! Chalk one up for planning!

Elements of the service came together as a meaningful whole — the three lessons, the three hymns, the sermon, the organ selections, the prayers, and even the children's sermon — everything "fit". Everything made sense. The theme of the day was duly reinforced. Planning ahead paid off and that meant something important to that one person who took the time to say so!

Of course we must try hard to make this happen all the time. Obviously it's not always 100% possible. Nevertheless, we must try.

In the Lutheran Church (and a number of other mainline denominations), our lessons are prescribed through a three-year lectionary cycle. Here we have a place to start the planning. Pastor is good about sticking with the day's theme, including content for the children's message, complete with "props". We now have coordinated index resource materials at hand so our Worship & Music Committee can more easily match appropriate hymns to the theme of the day. And the organist (hey, that's me) diligently attempts to select prelude, offertory, postlude and occasional special music that will enhance the theme of the day or highlight one or two of the day's appointed hymns.

In our life experience you and I have attended worship services perhaps better described as sacred variety shows; a hodge-podge of uncoordinated, unrelated, sometimes even including inappropriate elements — leaving you scratching your head and wondering just what happened here.

Again, total coordination cannot always be achieved. So important, though, to do our best in planning for worship. Not just for ourselves, but for all the folks in the pews. They come to church faithfully to be fed the Word. How great that the Word can be reinforced through music to listen to, music to sing to, messages that focus, even the weekly bulletin inserts that print out all that day's Bible readings you can take home with you.

Don't you just love it when it all comes together?

May all our days as church musicians be so great!

## About the Cancelled February 15th Meeting

We've had inquiries about what the program was to have been and whether it would be re-scheduled. No decision has been made, but maybe next season.

A number of chapter members provided ideas, instrumentalists and repertoire for the program. There were two goals: The first was to provide some examples of not too difficult music for instruments and organ (or keyboard), some samples of ways to use that music other than simply having an instrumentalist stand up and play—although there is nothing wrong with that! And there was to be opportunity for anyone there to give suggestions, too.

An example would be using instruments with congregational hymns (a few hand bells; a flute descant; etc.); an instrumentalist (violin, perhaps) "strolling" while playing; including the element of surprise by adding something as part of the liturgy ("silent" prayer or scripture text interpretation) rather than as a "solo". In other words, thinking outside the box or inside worship design.

For a quick source of descants, instrumental "additions", free accompaniments etc. to many hymn tunes I encourage looking at the series by Hal Hopson: "The Creative Church Musician Series", especially Volumes 1 and 4. (Vol. 1: The Creative Use of Handbells in Worship, Vol. 2: The Creative Use of Choirs in Worship, Vol. 3: The Creative Use of Descants in Worship, Vol. 4: The Creative Use of the Organ in Worship, Vol. 5: The Creative Uses of Instruments in Worship). Published by Hope Publishing Company.

The second goal was to provide a mini concert showing such elements in use and demonstrating repertoire. Many ideas certainly might not be new to many, but it was the hope to refresh the creative juices. A repertoire sheet of the music to be played and some other useful works is available. It is too large to include in this newsletter but can be made available later— perhaps at our next meeting or on the web site.
