"After All, We Don't Let Just Anyone Play Our Organ!" A sad testimonial by Aaron Sheaffer

Do you play an "open" organ? That is, are you an organist who recognizes the value of welcoming other organists to play your organ—for fun or practice? I was taught by my organ teacher (many, many moons ago) that it is actually good for an organ to be played **more** rather than **less**, and others should be welcome to play it. So, ever since, I have practiced an "open organ" policy in churches I've served. (Of course there are the usual limitations: it must not interrupt the church's schedule; pistons are not to be changed—with exceptions; or if building security is an issue; it's for organists or organ students). I normally notify the church staff of this policy. All went well . . . until I made too many assumptions.

I had a sad and unfortunate experience last week. Several weeks ago I received an email from the organist of a small church in a small town in Wisconsin who planned to be in Dayton with her husband who was attending the Hamvention. She asked if there were any organ programs going on that she might go to that weekend since she plays a small organ and likes to hear "big" ones when she has a chance. I don't know how she got my email address, but I gladly suggested organs and worship services she might enjoy (Westminster Pres, Christ Episcopal, Kettering Adventist, Piano/Organ Concert at First Baptist) with some of the best organs in town. Then I suggested that since Hamvention is really just around the corner from my Church (Shiloh) she'd be welcome to stop by Saturday and play as long as she wanted—the church would be open for our garage sale, and I told her the organ is never locked.

She did indeed stop by, music in hand. Then she was greeted ("intercepted"?) by one of our well-meaning members working at the garage sale. She said why she was there. The member said "Why I don't even know how to turn the organ on"—as if an organist would not! Long story short . . . she never did get to the organ! Obviously not everyone knew the open organ policy, for the volunteer later told me "after all, we don't let just anyone play our organ!" I informed her that indeed **we DO!**

I emailed the organist in Wisconsin an extensive apology. I just wish she had been a bit pushier . . . or that I had suggested she print out my email message just in case. Oh, well. And we are a church practicing "hospitality"!

I then realized that even though our Worship Committee and some others—but not everyone knew the rule, we had changed Church Administrative Assistants several times, and I had neglected to tell the latest one of the policy. My question to you:

Is *your* policy up-to-date and does anyone know?

P.S. For many years The United Sound, United Seminary's Choir, (which I directed for 30 years) toured for 10-12 days each year. I was appalled how often the local organ was locked—and we were scheduled for a concert—and the organist had the only key (and he/she frequently lived in the next town!) Finally, one organ company gave me a complete set of master keys for their organs.
