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
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Dean's Note: By Jerry Taylor

Matthew Phelps Organ Recital

Matt Phelps is a "local boy done good" graduating from Wright State, and CCM before being hired at the West End Methodist Church, Nashville, as their Minister of Music. West End is possibly one of the largest UM churches in the U.S. with a very large choir and music program.

Matt began organ lessons with Jerry Taylor, was accepted into Juilliard to study with Paul Jacobs and spent two years as a Director of Music in New York before returning to Cincinnati and now

Nashville. He sang in the Westminster Choir during his Wright State days and has composed several choral anthems that are sung by major choirs.

Matthew Phelps is the Minister of Music at West End United Methodist Church in Nashville, TN. At West End he conducts the Chancel Choir and oversees a multifaceted music department for children, youth, and adults. Dr. Phelps' performances have been described as "beautifully prepared," "beautifully shaped," and "moving and deeply meaningful." He is a Cincinnati native where he finished his Doctor of Musical Arts Degree in Conducting from the College-Conservatory of Music at the University of Cincinnati. Full Bio - Dr. Matthew Phelps is the Minister of Music at West End United Methodist Church in Nashville, TN. At West End he conducts the nationally renowned Chancel Choir on a weekly basis and performs major concerts with orchestra. He also oversees a multi-faceted music department that includes two adult choirs, four choirs for children and youth, and two handbell choirs. As an organist, he is one of three organists on staff who plays the 136 rank Moller organ; the largest organ in the state of Tennessee.

This coming season, Dr. Phelps will lead the Chancel Choir in a performance of Bach's Christmas Oratorio. He will also prepare the choir for a performance of Beethoven's Mass in C, led by guest conductor Earl Rivers.

Dr. Phelps has put West End at the forefront of Nashville's classical music scene.

Of West End's Christmas Concert last year, the Nashville Scene wrote: "In a season overloaded with dedicated repertoires, West End United Methodist Church reaches beyond the standard hymns and carols for an afternoon of festive selections that skirt Christmas norms." Dr. Phelps' performances have been described as "beautifully prepared," (Mary Ellen Hutton, Cincinnati Post) "beautifully shaped," (David Katz, Chief Judge of the American Prize) and "moving and deeply meaningful." (Walter Bitner, Nashville Symphony Orchestra)



Dr. Phelps is also the founder and artistic director of the professional chamber choir Vocal Arts Nashville. In their first season, the ensemble will present the complete Bach motets, along with American choral gems and Brahms' Liebeslieder Waltzes. An active organ recitalist, Dr. Phelps has played in churches around the country including regular engagements at the Church of St. Mary the Virgin in Manhattan. Dr. Phelps is also an active pianist, often performing with violinist Erin Hall and cellist Keith Nicholas as a member of the Ellison Trio. In the spring, he will join 15 other pianists in a complete performance of Beethoven's 32 Piano Sonatas. In June of 2018 he will perform Ravel's Piano Concerto in G with the Nashville Concerto Orchestra. He is on the faculty of Lipscomb University where he teaches courses in theory and church music.

Dr. Phelps is from Cincinnati, OH where he finished his Doctor of Musical Arts Degree in conducting from the College-Conservatory of Music at the University of Cincinnati. He worked extensively in New York City and Cincinnati before arriving to Nashville; and his choirs have performed at regional conventions of MENC and ACDA. Dr. Phelps was the winner of the 2015 American Prize in Choral Conducting and has placed in performance competitions as both an organist and pianist. He studied conducting with Earl Rivers, Mark Gibson, and Stephen Coker. He has studied organ with Jerry Taylor, Thom Miles, Matthew Lewis, and Michael Unger. He lives in Bellevue with his wife Colleen and son Noah; and is an avid chef.

NEW YORK CITY—The American Guild of Organists (AGO) is proud to announce five PIPE ORGAN ENCOUNTERS (POEs) for students aged 13–18, and one POE+ for adults in 2018. Complete contact information for each weeklong Pipe Organ Encounter can be found in The American Organist Magazine and online at:

The PIPE ORGAN ENCOUNTER (POE)

is an introduction to the pipe organ through instruction in organ playing, repertoire, history, design, and construction. These regional summer music camps for teenage students provide private and group instruction in service playing and solo repertoire, opportunities to learn about the musical heritage of various religious denominations, and a chance for young musicians to meet others with similar interests. Piano or organ proficiency ranging from intermediate to advanced is required. Scholarship assistance is available.

The POE+ is a summer program filled with practical information and instruction for adult keyboard musicians interested in improving their service-playing skills. Participants will be introduced to basic organ skills through private instruction and classes. The weeklong experience will lead to greater confidence and competence at the organ.

Generous funding from the Associated Pipe Organ Builders of America (APOBA), the American Institute Organbuilders (AIO), the Jordan Organ Endowment, and the National Endowment for the Arts will support these summer educational programs from coast to coast. "The AGO and APOBA have enjoyed a mutually beneficial relationship since 1975," declared AGO Executive Director James Thomashower. "Likewise, the AIO has been active in supporting the Guild's educational programs, beginning with their partnership in Pulling Out All the Stops, a video produced jointly in 1996 by the AGO, AIO, APOBA, the Organ Historical Society, and the American Theater Organ Society and aired on PBS. In addition, we are delighted to have received support from the Jordan Organ Endowment at Columbus State University for our POE program, as well as a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts supporting our educational activities this year."

In addition to the POE and POE+ programs, but not offered in 2018, is a POE (Advanced) that provides intermediate to advanced classes in areas such as organ literature, history, pipe organ construction and design, music theory, improvisation, conducting, and service playing for students who have achieved a high level of success in organ study. Also, there is a POE (Technical) designed for students who are interested in learning the art and craft of organ building. The event is hosted in the workshop of an organ builder working in cooperation with a local AGO chapter.

POE site locations are selected by the AGO Committee on Pipe Organ Encounters and approved by the AGO National Council. Applications for 2019 are available from AGO National Headquarters and online at www.agohq.org.

Service Playing Exam Program By Terry Donat

The application deadline for this year is February 1st, and recordings submission is March 31, 2018. So, while it may be too late for some of us to pass this year, we have a great head start on preparing for 2019. New requirements for 2019 should be available in the July 2018 The American Organist.

We had some fine demonstrations of a Bach fugue, hymn playing and anthem accompaniment. Each of us received the "Examination Hymn Booklet- 2013" for hymn playing and transposition practice, as well as some great advice and Q/A from Judy. Also, Ellen Bagley had new chapter directories and gave us some up-dates on membership.

I am hoping that our chapter can be well represented with many successful SPC candidates.
