Sub-Dean's Note by Dr David Crean

Dear Members,

Thanks to all who led, hosted, or attended our events during the just-concluded 2018-2019 program year. We began with our annual carry-in dinner at North Riverdale Lutheran church in September, and concluded the year in the same space with our



annual academy recital and installation of officers. We heard wonderful performances from Christopher Houlihan and Grant Wareham, and informative workshops from myself and Dr. Richard Fitzgerald. Priscilla Acuff led a tremendous team of volunteers in another successful Pedals, Pipes, and Pizza at the Dayton Masonic Center.

The two main topics of discussion in the wider organ world over the last month have been the tragic fire at Notre Dame in Paris and the passing of Dr. Marilyn Mason, longtime professor of organ at The University of Michigan in Ann Arbor.

The April 15 fire at Notre Dame Cathedral destroyed the iconic spire and most of the roof, but, incredibly, largely spared the interior. Like most large Parisian churches, Notre Dame actually has two organs, the Grand Orgue (Great Organ) in the rear gallery, and a smaller choir organ in the chancel. As with the cathedral itself, the great organ was not built by a single builder at one time, but has been rebuilt, expanded, and altered numerous times over the past several centuries. The oldest pipes are from a 1733 instrument by Francois Thierry, which was subsequently expanded by Clicquot in 1780s. It was in the "French Classic" style, with blazing reeds and brilliant mutation stops. A significant renovation was undertaken by the great builder Aristide Cavaille-Coll in the 1860s, which added expressive divisions and many warmer, romantic stops. Numerous subsequent restorations and expansions have added a Resonance division, several chamade stops, electro-pneumatic key action, new consoles, and even a MIDI playback system. The most recent work was completed by Pascal Quiorin in 2014. Many notable organists have

held positions at Notre Dame, including Louis Vierne, Pierre Cochereau, and Olivier Latry.

Due to its location in the rear of the church, the great organ largely escaped significant damage in the fire, although it did take on a good amount of dust when the roof collapsed. Quorin and others are hopeful that it will need minimal repairs. The smaller choir organ was installed in 1960s and is of more modest scale. It was significantly damaged by water during efforts to extinguish the fire. It's long-term viability is unclear.

Closer to home, longtime organ professor Marilyn Mason passed away on April 4 at the age 93. She served for 67 (yes, 67!) years at the University of Michigan, where she taught some of the greatest organist of the past several generations. An active recitalist for most of her professional life, she also commissioned dozens of new works from major twentieth-century composers. Her full obituary from the New York Times can be found here:


A Fond Farewell to Daniel Yoder

Visit the Dayton AGO Music Library

The music is arranged by composer for much of the work but also has groups organized by holiday, collections, anthology, wedding music, sheet music and lots of monthly's like the Organ Portfolio.
