Confessions of an AGO member



I grew up in a small town. After my piano teacher retired, my mom convinced a local organist to give me lessons. We had a second hand Hammond B-3 at home, with a full pedal board. My teacher went full steam ahead teaching me how to play organ. I didn't realize it at the time, but when I got to college lessons I knew she had prepared me with all the appropriate literature one should know. I've always been curious how she ended up in that small town nearly 2 hours from any major city with that kind of expertise. I never thought to ask until it was too late and she had passed.

In college, I continued to learn on small but serviceable pipe organs; a 7/2 Bigelow and a 15/2 Wilhelm. Due to the Hammond and these small instruments, as I moved along in my career, I subbed on whatever instruments a church owned. After college, I wasn't around other organists and never had much communication with whomever I was subbing. Every organ was different and there wasn't a lot of time to do a lot of registration experimentation.

Enter the AGO-Early in my membership experience, at one AGO workshop, the organist talked about "unison off." I had seen that on organs but had not idea how to use it. It was demonstrated and a whole new world opened up on creating registration! That learning continues today. Very rarely to I leave a meeting or workshop without learning something new. I realized that although we may take lessons and work as organists, we don't have much opportunity to talk with other organists and learn from them unless we are part of an organization like AGO. It has been invaluable to me in my growth as a musician and organist. Get involved in our chapter and ask questions! Someone in our chapter may know the answer.

Covenant Presbyterian Church is a mission-driven, inclusive community in downtown Springfield, Ohio. Covenant is seeking an organist to join our music program. We offer a weekly traditional service at 10:30 am in our beautiful

sanctuary. Covenant has a long tradition of quality music programs that enhance the worship experience and engage the community-at-large and a congregation that loves and appreciates good music. Our Schantz organ has 3046 pipes, three manuals, full pedalboard, and 56 ranks. It was built and installed in 1962 and is maintained by Peebles-Herzog, Inc.

This part-time position includes a weekly Sunday morning rehearsal and service and negotiable Thursday evening rehearsals. The service music includes prelude, hymns, anthem, Doxology, Gloria Patri, and postlude.

The organist is also responsible for evening holiday services as needed including Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, Carols & Lights, Christmas Eve, and Christmas occurring on a Sunday. For additional compensation, the organist serves as the point of contact for weddings and funerals and, if requested, provides music for these services. Ability to play the piano is preferred. Full position description available upon request.

Education/Experience: Bachelor of Music in Organ Performance preferred or equivalent experience. Salary range: Minimum \$24,000. Salary is commensurate with education and experience. What inspired your decision to be an organist?

It is wonderful to speak to a smiling and joyful crowd.

I was playing for a wedding and an unusual version of The Lord's Prayer was requested. The soloist didn't show up. I struggled and so did everyone else. I felt so bad for the couple.

What bits of advice would you give a beginning organist?

Remember you are playing for someone besides the congregation and God never asks for more than you can give.

Piano Masterclass & Gala Concert featuring Kara Huber, Grammy-nominated concert pianist joined by Dr. Yun Kim, concert organist



WANT TO PLAY THE DAI SKINNER?

The Dayton Art Institute Skinner organ is a wonderful instrument with some absolutely beautiful voices. The organ is located within the beautiful Italian renaissance style Rose Auditorium. Both the organ and the Rose underwent extensive repairs and renovations from 2015-2017 which makes playing there a simply awesome experience. In addition, the museum staff are extremely friendly and supportive. I love to play at the DAI. I have organized and played a wide variety of programs there since 2010. If you'd like a chance to play the DAI Skinner, there are two great ways to get engaged. They include the regular Sunday afternoon organ programs and my personal favorite, the "Halloween Spooktacular."

Regular 1st and 3rd Sunday afternoon organ programs are designed to be informal, fun, and a little educational. People are welcome to come in and out of the auditorium during the performances. I liken it to the Wanamaker performances. With the doors open, the sound carries throughout the galleries for people to enjoy. It often brings them into the auditorium like the pied piper. One of the best parts is that you are free to play whatever you like. I recommend a program with a wide breadth of music. I often play programs ranging from Roberday fugues to Walt Disney. Also I typically play music for the holidays in the month like "Love Songs from the 1500s to 2000" for Valentines Day; German Oom-Pah music for Oktoberfest (one of my favorites); and Patriotic music for Memorial Day, Fourth of July, and

Want to play a DAI concert?



Begun in 2010 by Matt Dierking, these concerts serve to generate interest and educate museum patrons on the pipe organ by playing a wide variety of music and showing off the many varied dimensions of the DAI Skinner Organ.



Veterans Day. Again, it's your chance to go wild. Thanks to Mary Ellen Clinard, Terry Donat, Alan Kimbrough, Rachel Lammi, Donna Larson, Jimmy Leach, and Grant Wareham who have all played programs. Sorry, I'm sure I missed some! When you play there, I highly recommend talking with the audience about the music you play, the DAI organ, organs in general, and ask for audience questions. You can also talk about the AGO and our events and resources. Sometimes the audience is quiet, but they are always friendly and appreciative. When they're engaged, it can be great fun. The excitement and curiosity of kids can be especially fun and rewarding. The audience will usually be a mix of regulars, new folks who made the visit for the organ program, and new folks who just wandered in. There are typically 20-30 people, but on occasion there have been up to about 100. It just depends on the day. It is surprising how many times people say it was the first time they heard a pipe organ live. This is a great way to promote the pipe organ, the DAI and the AGO. These programs are one hour long, but the actual music time will vary with how much you and the audience talk.

The DAI's 7th annual Halloween Spooktacular will be held on Sunday October 29th, 2023 at 2:00 pm. The Spooktacular is a "Silent Film" event mixing scary films with funny music, wacky films with creepy music, and bone-chilling films with eerie music. For me, surprise and juxtaposition are the keys. The first Spooktacular was played in 2017 by Matt Dierking and Lynn Mishler, but more eerie organists soon joined in the fun. From the beginning, the Spooktacular has been one of the most fun and best attended organ events. Matt Dierking, Priscilla Acuff, Mary Ellen Clinard, LynnMishler, and Trudy Faber played the last Pre-Covid "Spooktacular." The 450 usually pretty full auditorium is for the seat "Spooktacular." Playing the "Spooktacular"







can be a little more challenging since you will be accompanying a silent film. The most difficult approach is the full silent film approach which requires timing different themes, registrations, and keys to support the movie action. (The Tom Mix cut sheet picture shows the beginning themes used throughout the film "King Cowboy" listed by moment in the film. The organist would improvise on these. Priscilla Acuff and Yun Kim are great at this!) The second approach is easier and combines a single (or few) pieces or themes with significant timing, tempo, volume, and key modulations to support the action. It still requires timing but the changes are slower and less frequent. The final and easiest approach is to play a single piece slightly modified with tempo, registrations, repeats, etc. to support the music. We try to mix all these approaches in a "Spooktacular." If you're new to this, we can help you find films, suggest music to play with it, and help you with the accompaniment approaches. Covid caused DAI operating restrictions and late program approvals. Therefore, I played those "Spooktaculars" as a lonely ghost. Now the museum is back to normal operations and the 2023 "Spooktacular" is back on in full spooky form! The "Spooktacular" is great fun for the organists. We dress up, give each other spooky names, combine great music with crazy films, and then head to dinner in costume after the program to celebrate. I hope we will have three or four organ ghouls join in again this year. If you would like to play for a Sunday program or "Spooktacular," please let me know.
